# **Every Egg Counts At NestWatch!**







It is never to late to send your nesting data to <u>nestwatch.org</u>. Your data gives scientist around the world access to valid data they would never be able to collect otherwise.

"Food is the biggest issue for birds when we have severe ice and or snow storms. IF they have good quality food sources all during these storms, then the birds will survive fine. If they go a couple of days with all of their food covered in ice and snow, then in just two or three days they will burn off what little fat they have stored, their body temperatures will slowly drop and they will end up dying, more from a lack of food than from actual cold temperatures."

# **FALL Into SPRING Activities**

The time to prepare for nesting season is now!

- Clean out old nesting materials, spray inside with 10% chlorine solution if necessary.
- Trim away any plant materials encroaching on the nestbox space.
- Mow often, low vegetation encourages insects which is the staple summer food source.
- Paint nestbox exterior white, or other light color, to help reduce impact of our hot Texas summers.
- Install HeatShields on your nestbox or place in location with afternoon shade.
- Soap the inside roof to discourage wasps from building a nest. More nest boxes.
- Install a Kingston Predator Baffle on the pole to serve as a predator deterrent.
- Build more nestboxes. Download the complete TBS nestbox plans.
- Plant berry-producing shrubs for winter food. (American holly, American beautyberry, parsley hawthorn, flame-leaf sumac, pokeweed, elderberry. Download TBS plant list.

Once home (with aching backs), they unloaded the nestboxes. A few days later, they rented and loaded a trailer, hauling the nestboxes from their home in NE Texas to Midlothian, south of Fort Worth. After Symposium, they loaded the trailer with nestboxes that needed to travel to our Kyle

Storage south of Austin. So, on Sunday, once again they were unloading and stacking nestboxes.

# Frostweed - A Perfect Wildscape Plant

When designing your wildscape garden, you want to choose plants that will actually attract wildlife. Native plants fit the bill perfectly. They are welladapted to the area and wildlife recognize them as a source of food. For birders out there, do not think of those plants that just attract birds. Think of plants that will also attract insects because insects attract birds. A native, nectar-rich plant that is showcasing its beauty in the fall is frostweed, Verbesina virginica.


Frostweed goes unnoticed most of the year until August when it begins to bloom. Its bloom time extends into November. Clusters of small white

flowers begin to open in late August just in time for fall migration of the

monarch butterfly. Other pollinators such as wasps, bees and other butterflies also enjoy the nectar-rich flowers. The foliage is also a larval host for the Summer Azure, Bordered Patch and Silvery Checkerspot butterflies. The plant is highly deerresistant.



Frostweed is a native found in shaded forests in the Eastern half of Texas. Its range extends from Pennsylvania west to



erage height is two to four feet. Under moist conditions it can reach six feet. Trimming it back in June will give you a fuller plant with more blooms. The stems of the plant produce long, green, ribbon-like flanges or wings that run the length of the stem. The leaves used by native Americans to treat fever, chills and body aches. Also dried and used as tobacco by some indigenous peoples.

Propagation is by spreading underground rhizomes and by seed. Collect the seed when fully mature and sow in late fall. Root cuttings can also be taken in winter when plant is dormant.

> Consider adding frostweed to your natural landscape, perhaps pairing it with beautyberry. The combination of white flowers of the frostweed paired with the purple berries of the beautyberry makes a stunning statement in the



Frostweed gets its name from the plant's ability to squeeze water from the stem when it freezes in win-

ter. As the water is squeezed out, it forms ribbons of ice crystals that can take on quite beautiful shapes.
