Nestbox Construction

Lonnie has now traveled a few thousand miles (and hours) visiting each builder and delivering supplies. He explains,

this organization! Because of their dedication to building nestboxes, we are still in the business of fulfilling our mission."

Lonnie thoroughly enjoys his role as Nestbox Construction Coordinator. Don Lawrence created the Certified Nestbox Builder program as an innovative solution to TBS' transition from one builder, one location, to multiple builders, multiple locations.

The Certified Nestbox Builder Program process guarantees that each nestbox the organization distributes, regardless of who built it, will be essentially the same. An absolute priority for TBS is providing the exact same construction quality and materials in each nestbox.

Nestbox Builders Commit

This is such an important process as each builder commits to build at least

250 nestboxes during a two month period each year! Thank you, builders!

What Does He Do?

The Nestbox Construction Coordinator does exactly what the title implies – coordinates which builder is available, orders, and sometimes in recent years, delivers, the lumber and supplies to the builder. The job continues with coordination of transporting completed nestboxes to one of the two storage facilities in Conroe or Kyle. A huge volunteer task. (TX Blues May 2018)

As much as Lonnie loves his role as Nestbox Construction Coordinator, his wife, Letitia, shares that he loves another task even more.

"Lonnie thoroughly enjoys being a part of TBS. He loves people and he loves bluebirds. Lonnie promotes bluebirds to everyone ... he loves to spread the word to anyone he meets!"

Lonnie agrees with Letitia. "You know I will go anywhere anytime to give a bluebird presentation. I've never met a bluebirder I didn't like... they are good people."

New Interim President Shares Bluebird Story

My love of bluebirds began almost 20 years ago when my older brother gave me my first two boxes that he had made, signed, dated and numbered. He gave our mother #1 and #2 and I got #3 and #4. I didn't put them up right away and then the unthinkable happened, he passed away suddenly and very unexpectedly. My life came to a sudden stop as did my whole family! It wasn't until some months afterwards that I remembered my bluebird boxes he had given me. I was so happy and sad at the same time to see them and didn't realize at the time how they were going to help me heal and put a smile on my face!

Growing up we always had a bird house whether it be on a tree, or a post in the garden, but I wanted a very special place for these two bird houses, so I started researching where to put them. My husband dug holes and we placed them on t-posts in our back yard, close to our house, so I could watch and enjoy them! Those two boxes started up what is now known as the "Back Forty Bluebird Habitat" in Huntsville, TX, Walker County.

After researching information on the do's and don'ts of putting up a nestbox we began putting up the nestboxes. I started with a couple more and I was so excited to add to the ones that I had been enjoying my brother had given me! Unfortunately, by this time those original boxes were falling apart and had served their purpose, to show me the love and appreciation to family that bluebirds have to each other and their babies!

I was sad but ok that we had to take those nestboxes down and put up some new ones. So, my husband, Huey, started digging and measuring to make sure they were perfectly in place and ready to go! We put a couple close to the house so I could still watch and enjoy them! It wasn't

long after that, that I had bluebirds in every nestbox and I was excited and very happy!

We live west of Huntsville and very blessed that we have some acreage and lots of areas that are perfect for the nestboxes.

I was really enjoying my new nestboxes and there was a 100% occupancy. So again, very excited and happy!

While researching and learning more about the Eastern Bluebird, I happened to stumble onto the website for the Texas Bluebird Society. It had so much information on these beautiful birds and I was thrilled to learn and read all the information. Also, there was information on signing up to become a member. I gladly paid our family membership fees and we have been members since 2015.

It wasn't long after becoming a new member and reading the newsletter that I saw the society was having a TBS conference in Bryan/College Station and I registered to attend with my daughter, Whitney and granddaughter Campbell. It was such a fun and very informational day and we all came home with new nestboxes.

We added two more nestboxes to our little piece of heaven on earth and the next year another two and then you got it, another two more! So, we currently have a total of ten nestboxes on the Back Forty! All numbered (like my brother did!) so I can keep up with records on what's happening and going on with each nestbox. So far this year, I have raised approx 200+babies.

I have a couple of boxes close to our house so that I can watch and enjoy the male and female work together to build their little nest. I watch her go in and out laying her eggs, and once the eggs hatch, they are both really busy feeding and taking care of their family!

It is a little sad when the babies grow up and leave their nest, because I have to remove the empty nest, but then I remember, that they are going to bring someone else all the happiness and smiles that they bring me and it's all ok!

I think a lot of them stay close by, because within days or weeks of removing the old nest another couple are working together and building another one. It's amazing to watch!

Much to my delight, I had 7 eggs in one nestbox a couple of months ago. That's a FULL nest, and when they start growing, it gets kinda crowded, but they don't seem to mind being all piled up together!

Since I have enjoyed having and raising bluebirds so much, in May of this year, I became a TBS Nestbox Distributor. From the TBS website (txblues.org) you can find a list of distributors in your area and information on installing your nestbox. It's that easy to start up and learn all about the Eastern Bluebird, the "The Bluebird of Happiness" They live up to their nicknames, because over all the years of having my nestboxes and bluebirds they have brought so much happiness to me and my family!

I get so excited helping others sign up and getting them started with their nestboxes because I know the joy and happiness they will receive now and in the future watching and raising these beautiful birds!

Share The Joy With Family And Friends

Arjun Jenigiri, our youngest member, has begun introducing his family and friends to the joys of observing bluebirds, taking action to help provide appropriate habitat, and of course, reporting the nesting results to NestWatch. Arjun also shares his love of photography with his cousin, Varun Cherukuru and his best friend, Neal.

Nancy Payne, with Arjun's help, installed 4 nestboxes at Valley Ranch/ Irving in January 2022. (TX Blues March 2022) Arjun passed the NestWatch Monitor Certification and accepted the responsibility of being the official Nestwatcher for their trail. In addition, Arjun also checks the nestboxes, removing old nests, and checking for signs of predators.

Arjun and Varun share their story.

Arjun reports: I manage 4 Eastern Bluebird houses. This year we had two bluebird broods. I take my cousin to my bluebird houses when I check on them. Then, he got interested in bird photography and taking care of bluebirds.

When we went to his school (Westlake Academy) on the weekend, we saw 2 old bluebird

houses in a pollinator garden that had not been taken care of. We opened them and saw that they had old bird nests and active wasp nests.

Varum continues the report:

My mom and I got permission to take care of the bluebird houses and a bird feeder on the school campus. We cleaned up the bluebird houses by removing the old nests and the wasp nests. We then rubbed soap on the bluebird houses to stop wasps from coming again. We also installed 2 new bluebird boxes and predator guards. Within a few weeks, nests were being built in the 2 old bluebird nests by a Carolina Chickadee and an Eastern Bluebird. After those chicks fledged, the 2 new houses currently have Eastern Bluebirds building nests in them, and one has chicks already!

Varun joined TBS in January. He has also completed the NestWatch certification,, reports nesting activity and monitors the nestboxes.

Even though monitoring nestboxes is a serious responsibility, the boys still find time for their other love, photography.

Last year Arjun won the top award in his category in the Bird Photographer of the Year contest. Both Arjun's and Varun's photos are often featured in Ranger Rick's magazine as Editor's Photo Pick of the Month.

Kids Like Birds & Nature Too!

The Texas Bluebird Society was well represented at the Glen Rose WingDing Festival on April 15, 2023. It was a beautiful spring day in Dinosaur State Park. Along with Roberta Marshall, who organized our booth, Donna & Chris Honkomp and I were able to visit with many adults and children alike.

Most outdoor festivals have a family emphasis, so it's a good idea to bring a few things to attract children to the booth, and therefore attract adults to our nest boxes. You can never start too early educating children about bluebirds. Here's a few ideas you might consider at the next festival.



Fill a 13x9 cake pan with sand. Cut pipe cleaners to mimic mealworms.


Have the kids use clothespins to feed the bluebird (I found my chirping bluebird years ago at Walgreens, but any stuffed bird would do).

The children enjoy pretending to feed the bird, which provided sensory stimulation as well as an opportunity to teach what bluebirds prefer to eat.






Another activity is to have little ones build a nest. This requires a supply of twigs, scraps, and feathers for children to mold together and gives them something to take home. (any jellybeans on hand to use for eggs?)




TBS has always been all about nestboxes! Our logo promotes our mission to increase nesting sites for cavity-nesters.

By this time, we had an official nestbox specifically designed for Texas and approved by the North American Bluebird Society.

Brian and Judy Hetherington built the official TBS nestbox after attending a bluebird workshop. Along with Bob Houck and their naturalist club, they

built over 10,000 nestboxes in their 8 years of volunteering before moving to Australia in 2014.


The departure of our long-time builders Brian and Judy, inspired Don Lawrence to create the Nestbox Certification Program The program is in place and thriving, headed by Lonnie Castleman, Nestbox Construction Coordinator.

After a tremendous amount of hard work and dedication by a variety of volunteers, Lonnie was thrilled to announce this year:

TBS nestboxes are designed to meet the demands of the Texas

environment. The design plans are sized for Eastern Bluebirds and will accommodate other small cavity nesters. Follow installation instructions, and don't forget heat shields and predator guards.



Shannon Ramsey was one of the first volunteers when the Nestbox Certification Program began. There has been many transporting nestbox visits to Shannon's workshop in Timpsom. When his current batch of 164 nestboxes is complete, Shannon will have personally built 2,300 nestboxes for TBS! FALL Into SPRING Activities

The time to prepare for nesting season is now!

Clean out old nesting materials, spray inside with 10% chlorine solution if necessary.

- Trim away any plant materials encroaching on the nestbox space.
- Mow often, low vegetation encourages insects which is the staple summer food source.
- Paint nestbox exterior white, or other light color, to help reduce impact of our hot Texas summers.
- Install HeatShields on your nestbox or place in location with afternoon shade.
- Soap the inside roof to discourage wasps from building a nest.
- Install a Kingston Predator Baffle on the pole to serve as a predator deterrent.
- Build more nestboxes. Download the complete TBS <u>nestbox plans</u>.
- Plant berry-producing shrubs for winter food. (American holly, American beautyberry, parsley, hawthorn, flame-leaf sumac, pokeweed, elderberry. Download TBS plant list.

"Food is the biggest issue for birds when we have severe ice and or snow storms. IF they have good quality food sources all during these storms, then the birds will survive fine. If they go a couple of days with all of their food covered in ice and snow, then in just two or three days they will burn off what little fat they have stored, their body temperatures will slowly drop and they will end up dying, more from a lack of food than from actual cold temperatures."
